Brick stabilization including removing nonhistoric stucco and repointing	\$225,000.00	McCullough House Inn ca. 1812 needs all the handmade brick reworked by masons experienced with soft mortar and brick. Removing the mortar and replacing it after the Portland cement stucco has been removed will be time consuming. The original brick corbels must be replaced.
Replace twenty-five historic windows	\$25,000.00	This will cover part of the windows and private donors will cover the rest.

Please explain how these funds will be used to provide a public benefit:		
The goal for this project is to create the McCullough's Cedarhurst Historic Home and Garden that interprets the early development and agricultural history of the area during the antebellum period. The house will be restored to serve as a period interpretive space as well as museum display areas. The grounds will recreate the gardens of the period and allow for the demonstration of the farming practices of the early 19th century. Missing outbuildings will also be recreated to interpret the full picture of domestic life of both the landowner and the enslaved population. This site will be part of a series of historic sites that interpret life in the upstate throughout the 19th century and will foster tourism and create opportunities for hands on education for students in the area. It sits on the historic drover's road from Tennessee and Kentucky to Augusta and the old port of Hamburg, SC, often called the road to Augusta. It was an inn on the drover's road throughout the 1800s housing plantation owners traveling north in the summer to flee the low country as well as the drovers and their pigs, cattle, mules, turkeys and other livestock going south to the nearest navigable port, Augusta, in the fall and winter. The enslaved made the brick in a kiln across the road from the house and farmed thousands of acres. Their houses are documented along with the plantation house on an 1830s plat also identifying the road. Parts of the old road are still evident on the property. And there are two other inns on this historic byway in Greenville County as well. The Spring Park Inn on the old Buncombe Road (part of the Road to Augusta) in Travelers Rest has been restored to 1890 high style by the TR Historical Society. The Goodwin House Inn on Hwy. 11 and US 25 is being restored to 1850 by the Greenville County Department of Parks. All three of these inns will be open to the public with two of them maintained by historical societies.
