Finally, the sponsorship monies have been instrumental in supporting various events throughout the district. These sponsorships directly contribute to the furtherance of our mission by fostering community engagement and promoting the Olde English District. Through these funds, Ag & Art and SC Nature Based Tourism were both supported. We were also able to host the SC Outdoor Press Association Conference. This has resulted in reaching an audience interested in our state's natural resources and will continue to show results in the future.
